St Dominick WI – Inspirational talk by the co-founders of OVAID (Orangutan Veterinary Aid) at St Dominick WI

Dr Nigel Hicks and Sara Fell Hicks, who are an amazing vet and veterinary nurse team, came to WI to talk to us about their incredible work in Borneo, Indonesia where they care for the injured, orphaned or displaced orangutans.

Their work with orangutans began when Nigel went from his rural veterinary practice in the south west of England to volunteer in a wildlife vet programme in Borneo. He encountered many baby orangutans that were orphaned and animals injured and burned during the bulldozing and burning of their rainforest habitats that are constantly being destroyed by companies intending to plant many, many acres of palm oil trees.

Nigel was then invited to work as the head vet in Borneo from 6 to 8 months a year for the next 5 years. It was clear to him that the building they were using and the equipment that they had was no where near adequate for the massive numbers of patients that needed their care. So Sara and Nigel decided to set up the charity OVAID to provide rescue equipment, medical equipment, medical supplies and also training for vets to maintain the vet practices across the region of Indonesia. They provide scholarships for young vets to learn abroad or in-situ training. Funding and running their charity has now become their life work!

The orangutan is a beautiful mammal that lives in the canopy of the rainforest trees of Indonesia. They are usually solitary animals. They eat the leaves and fruits from the trees and maybe, if hungry, bark and termites. They share 96.4% of human DNA so they are very susceptible to human infections. They live to an age of 45 to 50 years old. They grow to be 6 times stronger than us!

Infants stay with their mothers for 6 to 8 years and they spend 2 years clinging onto their Mother until they learn to feed themselves, climb and use the trees as their highway to travel through the forest. They are arboreal and make a new nest every day to sleep in at night. A female will have only 3 to 4 babies in her lifetime. So numbers of orangutans are dramatically dropping as the population suffers loss of habitat through deforestation. It's a tragic situation.

There are only 100,000 left today despite conservation efforts over the last 20 years.

Palm oil production is not their only enemy! Coal mining, gold mining along with legal and illegal logging also endangers their fragile rainforest home. Sadly as the area of their forest home decreases the orangutan is forced closer to human habitation. Often displaced animals are killed when they enter towns because they are so strong or sometimes, especially babies, become pets or enter the wildlife trade. Once rescued into rehabilitation centres it's a long and expensive process often taking 10 years before an animal is fit and ready to be released back into the wild!

The World has become dependent on palm oil! It is in 50% of all food products and even Bio Diesel has palm oil in it! It is in shampoo and detergents and it is hidden on food and product packets under many different names, making it very difficult to identify and avoid! Sara and Nigel are advocates of alternatives to palm oil - they are spreading the word and as a WI we will be urging people to avoid products containing palm oil.

Sadly 80% of palm oil is produced in Malaysia and Indonesia and it has destroyed over 100,000 acres of delicate rainforest, the home of the

beautiful orangutan.

Sara and Nigel had a beautiful array of gifts and soft toys for us to purchase. Lots of fluffy orangutans were taken home by members for Christmas presents! The charity relays solely on donations to continue their incredible work. 

November Gardening/Nature Notes

As we approach the colder and wetter months our main jobs in the garden will be about protecting plants from the wilder weather to come.

Stake any tall or top heavy, leafy plants and draw some soil around the base of their stems to prevent "windrock". This includes pruning roses to about half their height to keep their roots firm.

Tender plants should be moved to the greenhouse or at least closer to the house for protection.

Whilst mentioning the greenhouse now is a good time to clear out any spent plants and clean the glass as this will allow maximum light for any plants that you may wish to overwinter. (This good practice would also apply to cold frames). It is also a good opportunity to drain any water butts and clean them on the inside.

Remember to raise pots and containers off the ground using "pot feet" or similar, to prevent them from becoming waterlogged.

Applying an autumn mulch will also help to protect plants and of course if you have a veg plot then it would benefit from a good covering of homemade compost.

In the flower garden lily and tulip bulbs can still be planted this month for a display next spring. Winter bedding such as wallflowers, sweet Williams, primulas and winter pansies could also be planted out into well prepared ground,

In the veg garden plants such as kale, brussel sprouts, parsnips and swedes can be harvested now but are considered to be better after a bit of frost. Broad beans can be sown in November in order to get the plants established before winter and therefore give an earlier crop in spring.

November is a good month for planting bare root plants for hedges or as shrubs, also for planting bare root fruit trees such as apples, pears and cherries.

If you are cutting back bushes and shrubs try to leave berries for the birds such as blackbirds and thrushes as well as for the winter visitors such as redwings and fieldfares.

If you have any ivy in your garden, and it is practical to do so, then try to leave as much to flower and produce berries as you can as this will provide a good food source for birds in the winter.

In the flower garden try leaving some plants such a sunflowers to go to seed to provide food for birds and the dead stems can provide habitat for overwintering wild life.

No doubt you will be adding fallen leaves and spent vegetation to your compost pile but if you are considering having a bonfire with material unsuitable for composting do check that there is no wildlife such as hedgehogs in residence before lighting.

Finally, as ever, continue to keep bird feeders clean and topped up with suitable food.

Parish council Meeting Oct 2025

This time we all had to be at the hall for 6.30 because members of the council wanted to have an update from the proposed solar farm development people, at least, all except councillors Potter and Hunn did, also Chairman Cox was a bit wishy washy about it but thought that in the

interests of democracy etc perhaps he should go with it as it gave the members of the public a chance to ask questions (again).

So the man came and duly addressed those there, Councillor Fry missed the first 15 minutes and apologies from Councillor Greene. Two members of the public attended, remember the days when all those chairs were put out just to be put away at the end?

The man said they had taken opinions on board and now the site wasn't visible from Kit Hill. He showed us what appeared to be pictures of the panels in the fog and to be fair they were not as visible as last time.

There weren't any questions that I can remember because the application 's not in yet so that was that.

The council meeting began with a presentation from a member of the public that resembled a "Dragon's Den" scenario. It was relating to the dog poo bags discussed at the last meeting, and this is designed to make people think about their behaviour. Small brown whoopsies, like a Mr Whippy icecream are to be attached to pertinent spots in the vicinity and these are actually poo bag dispensers for you to take a bag from to clean up after your dog!! Please use them. Lets see how it goes.

One step forward with the footpath at Dillets. As you know the council will pay for the materials if the parish council supply the labour and now we know they can actually do the work themselves, personally, as can anyone if they register with the countryside service for insurance purposes. There was still discussion as to whether to employ or work, words such as sub base and whacker were bandied around. Councillor Fry offered to do something about it as he knows someone. That's good.

Rubbish was still in areas of the parish that was supposed to have been removed, no one knows why. Other bits and pieces, Councillor Fry offered to cut a bit of hedge and also to repair some benches which needed a mix of seat and back rests replaced. The slats are in Councillor Wilkins' shed.

When he's done that he offered to go and see the member of public who wanted an outdoor gym as he has never materialised. If he's changed his mind he can come off the agenda. They couldn't remember if he had been officially invited or not so Councillor Fry is on the case.

Remembrance Sunday was sorted out, most attend.

Not much more this time. Councillor Wilkins is hero of the month this time as he had read through the insurance document before the council accepted it, all 70,000 words.

The accounts couldn't be approved for payment because as the meeting fell on the 1st of the month no one had sent any, so that was that. Also councillor Fry was reading the wrong page.

Now there allegedly is a new clerk, a lady. Because of this, and the change over with Jim, November's meeting is at the end of October, so if you get this in time, see you on 29th October, 7.00, Parish Hall


