| 3 | Report from the former Chairman of the Parish Council in 2024-2025 <u>Cllr A Cox made the following report;</u> Goal posts – 5 th March 2025 Cllrs Cox and Fry had arranged erection of the goal posts, with thanks to Cornwall Cllr Andrew Long and his community chest for a contribution towards these and to Cllr Wenmoth for first suggesting the idea. Pedestrian Gate into Lovells, The original Idea to lower the hedge on the boundary between Lovells and the Parish Hall was rejected by the Hall Committee and also the Parish Council. But we did agree to pursue the idea of a gate. The National Trust were happy with a gate and not removing the hedge. Not a unanimous decision to go ahead but ahead we went. It was completed in early February and I would say that, on the whole, it has been a success Well done to Cllr Greene for her tenacity in this project. Car parking It was suggested that we ease the parking by the school and certainly on match days by providing additional parking somewhere. The Clerk dutifully started looking for a potential site. The best option appeared to be at the end of school hill opposite the allotments. I won't go into any more much detail as I will revisit this in the next agenda item, projects for the next financial year. | |

Broadband

The provision (or lack thereof) of full fibre broadband, which I'm pleased to say, appears to be making headway due to the actions of some local residents duly aided by Cllr Andrew Long.

Day to day items

Recreation field The usual on-going maintenance, with new signage, gate springs, and bench repairs, with thanks to Graham and Dave (and me) for this.

The ROSPA safety report on the play equipment and field generally, had no red marks in their written report last year.

Wild flower meadow proposed for the corner of Lovells but I'm reliably informed wild flowers don't happen overnight so they may well be gestating somewhere as we speak.

Footpath by Dillets leading to Peppers Court.

I wrote to Cornwall Council about its poor condition and they replied "Your enquiry has been logged and has been referred Countryside Officer." He reviewed our enquiry in line with the Councils Service Standards and it was felt that the footpath is currently meeting those standards. The path will also continue to be monitored through our regular inspection process.

Planning

On one such application the Clerk was instructed by the Parish Council to inform Cornwall's Head of Planning that they were "the worst set of plans ever seen" and they were "treating the Parish Council with disdain." This was the ongoing saga of the land next to The Meadows for which planning has been turned down in Feb this year after going to committee at Cornwall Council.

Cllr Cox, Chair, gave an outline of future work

Continued day to day maintenance of assets including the Bus stop, recreation field inc play equipment. Benches are looking good but there is always something to be done, so my thanks to all councillors who take it in turns to do the weekly inspections of the play equipment and recreation field generally.

Footpaths.

Councillor Wilkins is our footpath specialist and has identified a number of footpaths that need some attention (styles mainly), and we have agreed to fund the repair thereof, so there will be work there.

Dillets - We are not giving up on this one, we will write to them again in this new financial year and indeed nag our Cornwall Councillor Andrew Long.

| | <p>Following a change to rubbish bin procedures and responsibilities at the school, we are in the process of obtaining a new bin for the recreation field and arranging its fortnightly emptying.</p> <p>The car park was going to be big but the Cllr Gill Brown's survey suggests there is no appetite for it, without parish support little chance of obtaining funding.</p> <p>Outside gym equipment</p> <p>Councillor Fry did a back of an envelope calculation and came up with a figure of £20k for a reasonable set of equipment, whilst I think it's a good suggestion we will need to do a lot more research: talking to the community, other councils and seeking out potential sources of funds. What exactly we would buy? And the issue with anything like this is the maintenance costs going forward. But I am going to put it on the agenda.</p> <p>Provision of a Flag Pole – is it to hoist a flag up or to hang a high tech Christmas tree on?? I think we might be turning to Gill Brown to get some feedback from residents on real trees v techno trees and whether there are any youngsters who are prepared to be lifted to great heights in all weathers to decorate a real tree as it is felt that some amongst us are getting too old for it. Cornwall Councillor

Councillor Long was unable to attend due to another meeting

Neighbourhood watch report

"Concerns in St. Dominick have mainly been about telephone and e-mail scams this past year. However we did contact the Police regarding an incident of apparently suspicious behaviour, but it cannot be reported in detail. There was no subsequent crime involved. We are grateful to the neighbour who reported this concern to us and we ask residents to be vigilant and to report concerns to us or in the case of an obvious crime or serious incident to the Police.

Obviously we are anxious as always to recruit new co-ordinators, not only to keep people in their immediate neighbourhood informed, but also to be more likely to hear about any minor theft or concerns that people might not otherwise report. A co-ordinator's job is not at all onerous. All it requires is maintaining contact with your near neighbours and providing them with information about any crime concerns in the area.

We were sorry to lose one of our most experienced co-ordinators in Derek Schofield, who sadly died during the year. Until ill health forced him to resign, Derek was a keen co-ordinator who served his neighbours well. He will be greatly missed."

Community Shop

Our sales have been at or just under target for this year. The Shop achieved a small surplus at the end of the trading year. Work has been done to review and implement changes to ensure the Shop is meeting its statutory responsibilities.

Reductions in wastage will end the year at about 28% lower than the budget allowance thanks to the diligence of the Shop Manager.

The 'Big Bites' products sandwiches are a steady seller, and the supplier has a better appreciation of the quantities we need to keep wastage at a low level.

The Shop daffodil logo on the front cabin was showing distinct signs of wear and tear. We are very grateful to Amy Camlin, who originally painted the logo, for offering to do the repair work. Our logo is now back to its former glory.

We are pleased to announce that, for the first time, the Shop will be awarding grants to support projects & initiatives that benefit the St Dominick community in our role as a Community Benefit Society (CBS).

The 2025 AGM will be on Thursday 18th September at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall.

Parish Hall

It's been another successful year for the Parish Hall.

We held our annual pasty and pud event last Autumn which again was a lovely social event with many villagers attending. A good start to December when the Callington Gospel Singers returned. This Christmas we will be hosting the Loveny Choir from St.Neut.

Our plant sale once again was a huge success thanks to a very hard working team. Not only committee members come out to help us with this busy event and I am very grateful for this and so appreciate everyone's help.

One committee member has retired and we sadly lost Norma Chapman, a committee member who has been with us since the Hall was built. We welcomed a new member and there is still room for a couple more if anyone is interested.

We have for some time been dealing with problems concerning the drains. We bit the bullet and employed a local firm of contractors who have replaced all the pipes running under the car park. There was broken pipes under the road and I am still waiting to hear back from South West Water in the hope they may take some responsibility for this and will recompense us as well.... Time will tell. Thanks for the community shop for their patience whilst this was ongoing.

As the car park was being dug up it seemed a good time to resurface the majority of it. This has now been done and huge thanks to The Parish Council for their donation towards the cost of this.

Bookings for the Hall remain steady. With the frequent use of the building we want to keep it in as good a condition as possible and to that end we held a working party a couple of weeks ago when volunteers came and we repainted the bottom parts of the walls and parts of the foyer. Again thank you to those who helped.

We decided to shelf the idea of replacing the hatch doors at the moment as we are unable to source anything suitable. We continue to research this.

We need to replace the guttering on the left side of the building where it has been damaged. This will be done soon.

We now have the Inpost lockers to the rear of the Hall and I am reliably informed that these are being used by many people.

Finally I'd like to thank the Parish Hall committee for all their hard work and support and also the Parish Council for their support. Thank you

St Dominica PCC

Churches in the Diocese of Cornwall are in 2 groups of 6 Deaneries each, and St Dominick is in the East Wivelshire Deanery; this is planned to be subdivided into 3 Benefices. At present we are in a Benefice with the parishes of Calstock, St Mellion with Pillaton and Landulph, and it is proposed that we will unite with the Callington Cluster to form the larger Kit Hill Benefice; however the process is incredibly slow and we are still in the Tamar Valley Benefice. Some progress was made last year in that Rev Andrew Atkins was installed as Oversight Minister

and Assistant Curate of the 2 groups of Churches, and the Service was held in our Parish Church.

Regular Services continued throughout the year with a Holy Communion on one Sunday a month, a Contemporary Celtic Worship on another Sunday and a midweek Holy Communion most months. Cornish Evening Prayer is also held at Halton Quay on the first Sunday of the month. Many of us go to other Services in the area if there is not one in St Dominic. We are most grateful to the retired ministers and worship leaders for continuing to take the majority of the Services.

Specific Liturgical times of the year were also celebrated, sometimes with our friends in the Benefice or Methodist Church. Once again donkeys led the Palm Sunday procession through the village to the Church via the Chapel, while hymns were sung and the liturgy of Easter reenacted. It was our turn to hold the Carol Service for the united parish Churches of St Dominic, and the Church was full for Christingle on December 24th. Easter was marked with the 'Stations of the Cross' on Good Friday and several of us went up Kit Hill at dawn for the joyful Churches Together Sunrise Service.

There were several funerals and memorial services in 2024, along with burials and interment of ashes in the Churchyard. Anyone who lives in the Parish is entitled to be buried or have their ashes interred in the Parish Graveyard.

We continue to liaise with the village Church of England Primary school, and the staff and children led services during the year, for harvest, Remembrance, Christmas and Easter, with input by Rev Andy or a lay minister. It is always lovely having so many young in the Church together with their families. They also held a service for the children going on to their next schools or colleges in July

Once again 2 Craft Fairs were held in the Church; these are very popular with locals and those from further away as there is a variety of locally made goods for sale and the refreshments served in the adjacent schoolroom are enjoyed by many. Whist being an outlet for crafters and artisans in the area they are also a vital source of income to help maintain the building and ministry of the Church. We also raised money for other charities from the Harvest supper auction and collections during specific services. The Friends of St Dominic Church also had several events and kindly paid for specific items of expenditure.

In January there was a concert by Will Keating and friends was held in the Church which was popular and well received; future events are being considered.

We continued to carry out the annual maintenance of the Church and Schoolroom, and 2 areas of ingress of water were solved, thanks to grants from Cornwall Historic Churches and the Diocesan Ministry Fund as well as our Fabric Fund. We continue to be mindful that both buildings are listed and correct materials are used in their repair.

The Parochial Church Council, PCC, is responsible for the care and maintenance of the Parish Graveyard, and we use outside contractors; the cost of this has been covered by a grant from this Parish Council and donations from some families with loved ones buried in the Churchyard. Last year the contractor sometimes failed to come as frequently as we would

have liked, and has now given up the job. In We found one local person who has done the job so far this year, with help from another local man, but it took longer than they bargained for. Thus we have just employed another contractor for the rest of the season. However we have realised that the ongoing cost in future for keeping the whole area cut regularly is likely to be over £3,000 a year compared to under £1,200 in the last 2 years. The PCC will review the situation in the winter, with the possible idea of leaving some of it 'wilder' in future, but are likely to be having to economise and/ or find additional money.

During the year we continued to hear the bells when there were services in the Church along with practice sessions and visiting bands of ringers. Owen Borlase, one of the campanologists is currently President of the Diocesan Guild of Ringers, and our tower is often used to train new bell ringers.

The number of families coming to the Toddler group on Thursday mornings increased despite the older children moving on to nursery or school. It is lovely seeing the babies grow and take advantage of the different areas of the building for play and exploration.

The Church is normally open during the day, from 10am to 4pm, and all are welcome to come and look round the building, first consecrated in 1259, or to have a bit of peace and time of prayer. There are quite a few visitors looking to see where their ancestors have been married or worshipped in any way, also they are looking for the family graves.

The Church is 'not a building' but the people, and we extend our appreciation and thanks to all those volunteers involved in any way to the life of the Church, so that we can continue to be here for the people of the Parish.

Our November meeting saw us making beautiful decorations ready for Christmas led by our President Mandy and our December meeting was a Buffet meal for all our members organised by the committee and led by Sharon. The new year started with a talk by Dr Chris Smart on the Calstock Roman Dig. As we had as a group been shown the site at Calstock and handled some of the artefacts it was thought we would like to hear more and made our usual meeting an open one for the whole village. Our next meeting was the Voyage of the Mayflower, many interesting facts emerged including a list of famous Americans who descended from the early settlers, including our own Winston Churchill whose mother of course was American. One very moving talk was about the Mercy Ships who do wonderful work around the coasts of Africa operating on and treating those who would otherwise have no access to healthcare. A collection was taken and £200 donated on the night. Devon and Cornwall Police came to give us advice with their Cyber Awareness evening, again an open meeting for the village as a whole. Our visits have included a trip to the Box museum at Plymouth. Another farm visit to Deer Park Farm Callington. An evening performance of The Beast at Sterts theatre. Factory tour of Darlington glass at Torrington. Each month we have a planned walk which is organised by a committee member usually finishing very near to somewhere that serves coffee and cake! We have just reached our 79th birthday and are looking forward to March 2026 when we will be celebrating our 80 years as a WI in style.

Festivities Group

2024 saw the Festivities Group continue their annual events that remain free to the Parish. Namely the big Christmas Lights switch on which was on November 30th this year. We tried a new format of everything being done inside the Hall including the popular new addition of Dreckly Drummers, a talented showcase for some young drummers taught by our local drumming teacher Simon Stevens. The drumming was very well received although comments did suggest that it was a very loud event. We will be discussing this further before the 2025 switch on Saturday 29th November. The school choir came up trumps again with their lovely singing which was a huge contrast to Dreckly Drummers.

The tree looked magnificent and was again huge, with thanks to Jeff Roberts and Willis Gregg for making this happen and a big thank you to the Parish Council who have now undertaken to sponsor the tree upon annually receiving of a grant form.

Fundraising continued this year with the very very popular Wurlitzia which has become a bit of a Parish Institution and long may that continue.

The Easter Egg hunt this year was fun, with the rain stopping and Hunns Poultry sponsoring the eggs, all 720 of them and Matt from Moon Free donating some eggs to make sure all children in the Parish had something. The Rev Tim Wilkinson judged the Easter bonnet competition amongst the throng of people, free cake and coffee. A really really lovely morning.

Friends of St Dominica

The Friends support the church by raising funds through events in the village to help maintain the fabric of the building and by funding requests from the P.C.C such as paying for oil to heat the church.

Our fund raising events over the past year have been very well supported. The Cream Tea at Beech Haven on a beautiful Sunday afternoon was attended by a record number of visitors. A flower arranging demonstration by Mandy Nicholson was a huge success on one of the worst days for weather with extremely high winds and rain, only 5 ticket holders failed to arrive but a wonderful afternoon with fabulous arrangements (later raffled) and refreshments was enjoyed by all. Another social event was the yearly Coffee Morning to raise funds for a donation to the CHCT The Cornish Historic Churches Trust who over the years have made considerable donations to building work on the church. Last weekend Kay and Jessop Price opened their garden at Halton Quay. Again blessed with good weather and in beautiful surroundings more than 90 people enjoyed a cream tea at the end of their garden tour. Another good fund raiser for the church but also a great social event for the village.

This year we have been able to pay for a large repair to the heating boiler in the church. Made our donation to the CHCT. Provided books for the St. Dominick school leavers (our yearly gift) which gives advice on the transition from their Primary school to their new Secondary one. The purchase of a new water heater for the Schoolroom toilet. The Friends are also responsible for the distribution of the monthly Parish News which is delivered to 380 houses in the village, with copies also left in the Community shop and the church.

Update from the Tamar Valley NL & Tamara Landscape Partnership

Overview - It's been another success year of delivery for the National Landscape, with in excess of £1.3m spent on Nature restoration, historic barn restoration, pathways, new signage, benches, new ferry pontoons and protection of our 17 Special Species across the Tamar Valley. Funding from Defra is channelled into important projects each year, for more information check out our website, follow our social media or visit the Tamar Valley Centre between 10am and 4pm on a Tuesday.

- **Signage** – Project Officer Jane Hart supported the update of the St Dominica Heritage Trail interpretation boards at St Dominic Church car park, Halton Quay and the accompanying PDF leaflet. Working in Partnership with original board committee lead Carolyn Wilkins and with the approval of the Parish Council. This also included repairs to the Parish Council notice board to make water-tight for the new board/other notices
- **Funding** - Defra has supported our work with more **Access for All** funds and **Farming in Protected Landscape** funds this year, as well as capital funds to deliver sustainability or 30 by 30 goals for Nature restoration.
- **Tamar Valley Centre** - is a community space and we call it our NatureHub. It's available for bookings, including hotdesking and meeting spaces with excellent wifi and free parking. For more information check out our website or contact: holly.roberts@cornwall.gov.uk
- **Next 5 year Management Plan for the TVNL** -Tamar Valley National Landscape Partnership is continuing to create the next 5 year management plan for the area, for 2025-2030. Acting on the feedback from our two public consultations during July, September and October, we are currently revising the plan. We aim to have it adopted by the five local authorities - Cornwall, Devon, West Devon, South Hams and Plymouth - during the autumn. Tamara Landscape Partnership – Tamara LP has entered its final year, with project closing in summer 2026.

- The launch of the **Calstock pedestrian ferry** is imminent with a new skipper in place. Will be running a passenger service between both banks (C2C) and to Cotehele (once the National Trust has agreed re the landing). Other routes are planned plus private hirings.
- **Community engagement** - We're encouraging all PCs across the Tamar Valley to do more for Nature in their community spaces and to promote to their communities within their own homes. Road shows over coming months. Our intern Ginette Sutherland, visited St Dominic in November – meeting Gillian Brown to advise, provide information, and signpost to funding available to help make their spaces as welcoming to Nature as possible.
