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### ***Parish Council Meeting for March 2026***

This was the meeting where only councillors were present to decide on the co option of a new councillor. I can't tell you anything about what happened because, as I said, no members of the public were allowed to be present. Outside the hall at 6.55 with me were the representative of the national Trust, a member of the public, and a candidate. Two other candidates must have been there somewhere because the door opened and they were called in, so they appeared. After a few moments one came out and went home, one came in to watch the meeting and one sat down as a newly elected councillor.



I can't tell you anything about him because I've never seen him before, but we now have Councillor Simon Clewes, no doubt we will soon get to know him better.

We went in, present were Cornwall Councillor Andrew Long and two members of the public with me. Apologies from Councillor Brown, everybody else was there.

We started with a report from the National Trust, just to keep everyone up to speed on what was/wasn't happening. Basically the daffodils are blooming, the community orchard is underway, the Edgumbe tea room is closed indefinitely for maintenance and the Trust will inform everyone nearer the time of events. There was a bit more than that but it will all be published elsewhere I'm sure.

Councillor Wilkins offered assistance with repairing the posts which have rotted off on the trails. These shouldn't really have rotted, being oak, but that's modern progress.

There was no news on the cottage bollard but hopefully there will be (Andrew Long).

The landowner at Halton Quay has given permission for a grit bin to be placed somewhere, so that will happen sometime. There was an offer from someone (Natural England?) of a seat somewhere there but that's not as acceptable because there is no rubbish bin and there won't be a bin because there is no commercial collection down there.

Various bridges down in the wood are slippery so Councillor Wilkins is to stick/screw on some fibreglass adhesive strips. Councillor Potter proposed a vote of thanks to Councillor Wilkins for his labouring.

No sign of a Residents' Association yet.

There is a sad story about the work the councillors were going to do on the footpath at Dillets. If you remember the path is dangerous, the council said they didn't have enough money to repair it but councillors could do it themselves as long as they didn't use power tools. They were due to meet at 10.30 one Monday morning, Councillors Fry and Cox were going to set their alarm clocks early. Councillor Wilkins ordered the materials, this has been ongoing for ages and ages. Well, it seems

Cornwall Council knew there was an electrical cable going across the path, but delayed surveying it until work was imminent. And that was that. It apparently is much too dangerous for self help and they will do it, within six months. So that is exactly what was asked for last year. Back to waiting again.

Vogus Lane has now been adopted as a restricted byway, which means vehicular access to land only.

Councillors Potter and Wilkins were on field inspection duties last month, Potter the first half, Wilkins the second. Chairman Cox asked councillor Potter if there were any problems, he replied all was well. Something must have happened after his inspection because Councillor Wilkins had quite a long list of things, including the bearings on the carousel needed greasing, something was rusting and there were lots of rabbit/mole damage. Also the entry gate doesn't close properly, hasn't for years. I don't think there's any answer to the moles.

Councillor Potter was able to report that when he inspected the salt and grit bins he, as usual, found the shovels missing. However, he happened to come by someone clearing a house and acquired several old saucepans, which now have new homes. Perhaps people won't be as keen on purloining them.

Councillor Fry has found the wood and brackets he said he thought he had last month so will soon be putting up shelves in the bus shelter for books.

That was about it, the new councillor Clewes has to do his Code of Conduct training. The clerk asked if anyone was interested in the other training courses available but funnily enough no one was.

### ***Mini Book Review***

#### **- We Solve Murders by Richard Osman**

Amy Wheeler is a private security guard, currently working for celebrity novelist Rosie D'Antonio. Steve is her father-in-law (and also a retired policeman) who, since the death of his beloved wife Debbie, is happy to stay in his quiet New Forest village, where his life revolves around quiz nights and evenings in the local pub.

A series of people linked to the agency Amy works for are found dead, and one thing links them - Amy was in the vicinity when they were murdered. It looks like Amy is being set up and she needs help - so she calls on the only person she can trust, and who has a background in detective skills - Steve.

The three unlikely characters embark on a global search (taking in South Carolina, Dublin and Dubai) to uncover who is behind the killings (helped by the fact that Rosie Antonio is so rich that nothing is a problem).

The plot is fast paced and clever, with endearing and eccentric characters and plenty of jokes. Serious topics are tackled too, such as grief and loneliness, but with humour and wit. If you enjoyed The Thursday Murder Club series, I think you'll enjoy this. It must be a popular read as the second book in the series - We Chase Shadows - will be published in September.

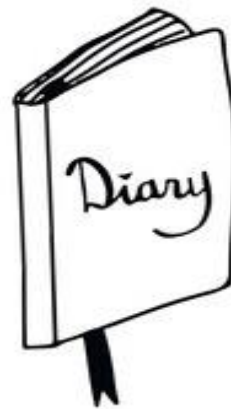

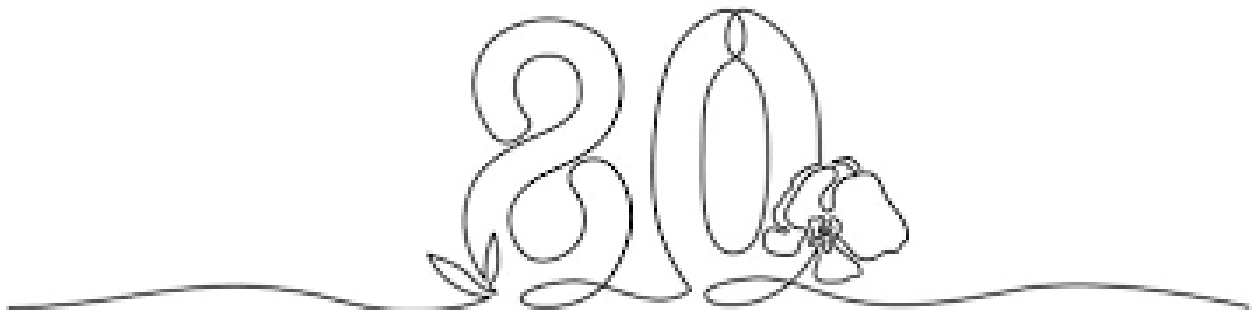

On Wednesday 11th March St Dominick WI celebrated our 80th Anniversary of the date that we started as a Women's Institute in St Dominick! We had a lovely birthday cake and a glass of fizz to celebrate and sang Happy Birthday!

Many members over the past 80 years have enjoyed the company of caring, kind, strong women. We have listened to numerous interesting talks and been on exciting day trips and walks with each other. We have made uncountable cups of tea and the talented cake making members have provided sustenance to villagers and members alike, whilst also winning many awards and competitions for their creative expertise! It is wonderful to reflect back and think about the contribution the WI has made to the St Dominick community over the last 80 years and here's to many more years of fun, friendship and finding out about Cornwall and the wider World in which we live. Coincidentally, the WI's 80th Birthday falls in the same year that our President Kate Wilkinson also celebrates her 80th Birthday! Happy Birthday to you Kate! If you are not a member and would like to meet our friendly group and find out more about the fun we have, please contact Gill Brown on the email below and come along to a monthly meeting to meet us all.

At the beginning of the evening, members enjoyed a fascinating talk by Gary Lewis who told us about the Tamara Coast to Coast Way and the wider work of the Tamara Landscape Scheme Project (funded by: UK Heritage Lottery Fund by £3.2 million and £2.4 million from Lottery Match Funding and generous 'in kind' time given by professionals) that has worked over the last 3 years to create an 87 mile route that journeys through the majestic Tamar Valley. The walk traces the winding course of the Tamar from the vibrant city of Plymouth to the very source of the River Tamar in Morwenstow near Bude. On the awe-inspiring 7 day walking route, you will pass through diverse landscapes, rich mining heritage, ancient landmarks, charming villages, ancient woodland and unspoiled natural beauty.

We were very interested to find out that whilst the route was being planned, cleared and created, many groups, school children, and individuals were involved to bring this amazing project to a reality. There were 10 separate projects that ran for 3 years whilst the walking route was being created which brought Communities together, brought educational Projects into schools and made some extraordinary discoveries about the heritage of the Valley and restored many valuable and unique historical remains from our mining history and other buildings and monuments within our landscape. Some of the fascinating projects include: 3D Digital records made of many of the mine buildings along the route which will preserve their structure for others to see, where it is sadly just too expensive to physically restore all the actual

structures. The Tavistock Task Force worked tirelessly on many sites to clear bracken and ivy at Okle Tour Mine and other sites and they restored the Saltash WW2 landing Craft Grid, which is a scheduled monument of 10 groynes left of the original 12. Detailed mapping was done where the 3 rivers (The Tamar, The Lynher and The Tavy) come together above Plymouth, where the River Tamar meets the sea, the mapping identifies all the 275 quays and landings along their course! An exciting Story Telling Project involving Calstock Primary School engaging the passengers on the railway links to the trail whilst the children travelled to the Tamar Valley River Festival. Kernow King brought history alive for children in his dramatic tour of schools acting out the history of this amazing Valley.

The Calstock Ferry was a 12 month trial and sadly isn't viable to continue but could be run for bird watchers and trips to Cotehele in the future.

This was all achieved by 4 members of staff and sadly draws to a close this March. The National Landscape Core Team will continue. Gary had enjoyed his inspiring work with the school children so much that, when this project closes, he is going to take up a post as Teaching Assistant at one of the schools he has worked so closely with.

We all wish Gary well with his future endeavours and thanked him for his invaluable part in creating this incredible walkway for many walkers, day trippers and future generations to explore and enjoy. The vote of thanks was delivered by Marion, encompassing the incredible Tamara Trail in a wonderful poem.

There is a guide book for sale that details the whole route, gives maps and describes the Tamar Valley Discovery Trail, link routes and alternative routes. Suggested accommodation en route and useful transport links can be found on the Tamar Valley website.

In April, our WI meeting will be held in the parish Hall on the 8th April from 7.30pm. Our talk will be about Matryoshka Russian Nesting Dolls given by Marion. 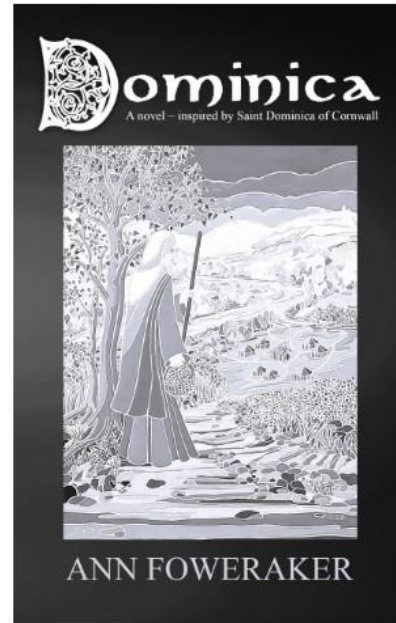

By the way, we never say 'no' to donations of cakes and raffle prizes. 😊



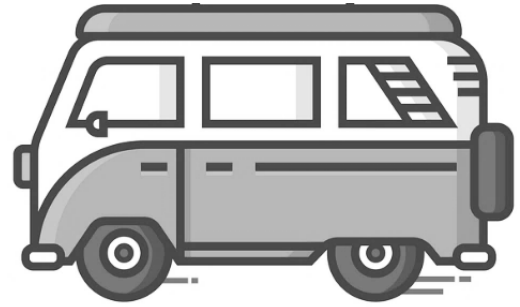
